The 2011 Massachusetts Curriculum Framework in ELA/Literacy includes separate strands for **Reading-Literature** and **Reading-Informational Text**. Therefore, these genres may not be combined in the MCAS-Alt portfolio strand in Reading. Teachers may choose to assess one or the other, but not both. The following information will assist in determining whether a text is literary or informational.
