Therefore, these genres may not be combined in the MCAS-Alt portfolio strand in Reading. Teachers may choose to assess one or the other, but not both. The following information will assist in determining whether a text is literary or informational.

    - technical texts: (directions from a manual or a recipe), information displayed in graphs, charts, or maps, and digital sources on a range of topics (must be in the context of a text, not in isolation)
    - historical, scientific, technical, or economic accounts (including digital sources)
    - journalistic pieces (news articles, magazine features, including digital sources)
